After the Sixth Tokyo International Conference on African Development (TICAD - VI) held in Nairobi in 2016 Japan and the African Development Bank (AfDB) have agreed to start up a project called Japan-Africa Energy Initiative with an amount of US\$6 billion. This Initiative will definitely contribute towards African countries critically needed energy demands. The Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) has also signed a JPY34.41 billion (about US\$ 300 million) loan agreement with the African Development Bank under the Enhanced Private Sector Assistance (EPSA) initiative, which is a component of Japan's Official Development Assistance (ODA) to Africa. This a clear sign that the pledge made in Nairobi by PM ABE on Japan's Official Development Assistance (ODA) to Africa i.e. US\$ 30 billion pledge and its components are getting fast trucked into the TICAD implementation process of 2016 – 2019. This is indeed a good signal to the strategic business interest of African countries and Japan. It is also a very significant qualitative and quantitative progress from the 1<sup>st</sup> Japan Africa Business Forum of 2014 to the current 2<sup>nd</sup> Japan Africa Business of 2017.

These and other initiatives that are being taken bilaterally and multilaterally with African countries by Japan will definitely give additional energy and power to the forum.

Words are good to hear but it is always good to remember: it is only action taken by the private and public sector that will enhance trade and investment and drive infrastructural development, which is key component to the continued efforts of industrial development in our African countries as well as in Japan.

Therefore in my capacity as Dean of the African Diplomatic Corps (ADC) and Ambassador of the State of Eritrea to Japan, it is prudent to congratulate and welcome these constructive steps being undertaken by Japan and the AfDB this evening. Announcements made this morning in the opening statement of Honorable Hisatake Sugi Parliamentary Vice-Minister of Finance of Japan have also further confirmed this fact to the forum.
